PRESIDENT'S LETTER

The year 2025 was intense and flew by — for us, this is not just a feeling, but a fact that you will also see throughout this report. We entered our sixth year of operations with one certainty: animal welfare is no longer a peripheral issue, but has taken a central place in discussions about food systems, One Health, and corporate governance. In a context marked by health crises, increasing regulatory pressure, and more conscious consumers, it is no longer possible to separate competitiveness, transparency, and responsibility in food production involving animals.

Throughout the year, we made progress on what we understand to be one of the sector's main challenges: corporate accountability. Through our Animal Watch reports and monitoring initiatives, we increased transparency regarding existing corporate animal welfare commitments and their levels of implementation. The data is clear: there is still a significant gap between what is publicly announced and what is actually delivered.

This scenario highlights an important limitation of the current agenda. **Making animal welfare commitments is no longer enough. They must be implemented consistently, transparently, and within clear timelines**, allowing society, the market, and public authorities to monitor progress. After all, discourse and practice must always go hand in hand, and it is no longer possible to talk about ESG without real implementation.

We will continue working to ensure that commitments are translated into practice, and that data is turned into concrete change, strengthening transparency as an indispensable pillar for the sector's evolution and for the development of more responsible, traceable supply chains aligned with society's expectations.

We thank everyone and every organization helping to build this agenda with us, especially those willing to move forward with responsibility and transparency.

Alianima is a non-profit civil society organization working to improve the living conditions of animals exploited by animal agriculture, prioritizing work with the most affected species, such as layer hens, pigs, broiler chickens, and aquatic animals.

Through our campaigns and projects, we bring together the food industry, government, and consumers to build a society that is more respectful toward animals and the environment.

Our work is structured around two main areas: Corporate Relations and Public Policies. In Corporate Relations, we engage with companies to promote the publication and implementation of animal welfare commitments by the country's largest corporations, while also generating data and evidence that strengthen and inform our work.

In Public Policies, we carry out strategic advocacy to place animal welfare on legislative and executive agendas, contributing to systemic change at the national level.

Our Communication and Operations teams provide cross-functional strategic support to both areas, strengthening the consistency and effectiveness of our initiatives. In addition, we work collaboratively through networks and partnerships to expand our collective impact — after all, no structural change happens alone.

CONTEXT

Egg production in Brazil is still predominantly based on cage systems, which are associated with low levels of animal welfare. At the same time, consumers are increasingly demanding cage-free systems, and we recognize the central role of the supermarket sector as a link between brands and consumers, as well as its economic relevance in the country.

In this context, we focused our efforts on strengthening transparency and the implementation of commitments made by retailers and wholesalers, with **the Egg Watch serving as our main strategic tool for monitoring the sector**. Through this initiative, we enhanced dialogue with companies, improved information reporting, and encouraged the transition to cage-free systems.

CONTEXT

Brazilian pig farming is one of the most relevant in the world and operates in a highly competitive international environment. In this context, animal welfare has ceased to be solely an ethical demand and has become a strategic factor in positioning the country in relation to markets with increasingly stringent regulations.

In 2025, we observed important progress in the adoption of more responsible practices, with highlights including the expansion of group housing during gestation among pork suppliers and the increase in public commitments to the pre-implantation group housing of sows in new facilities. This is evidenced by **the 100% response rate from suppliers invited to participate in the Pig Watch survey, which, in 2025, reached its 6th edition.**

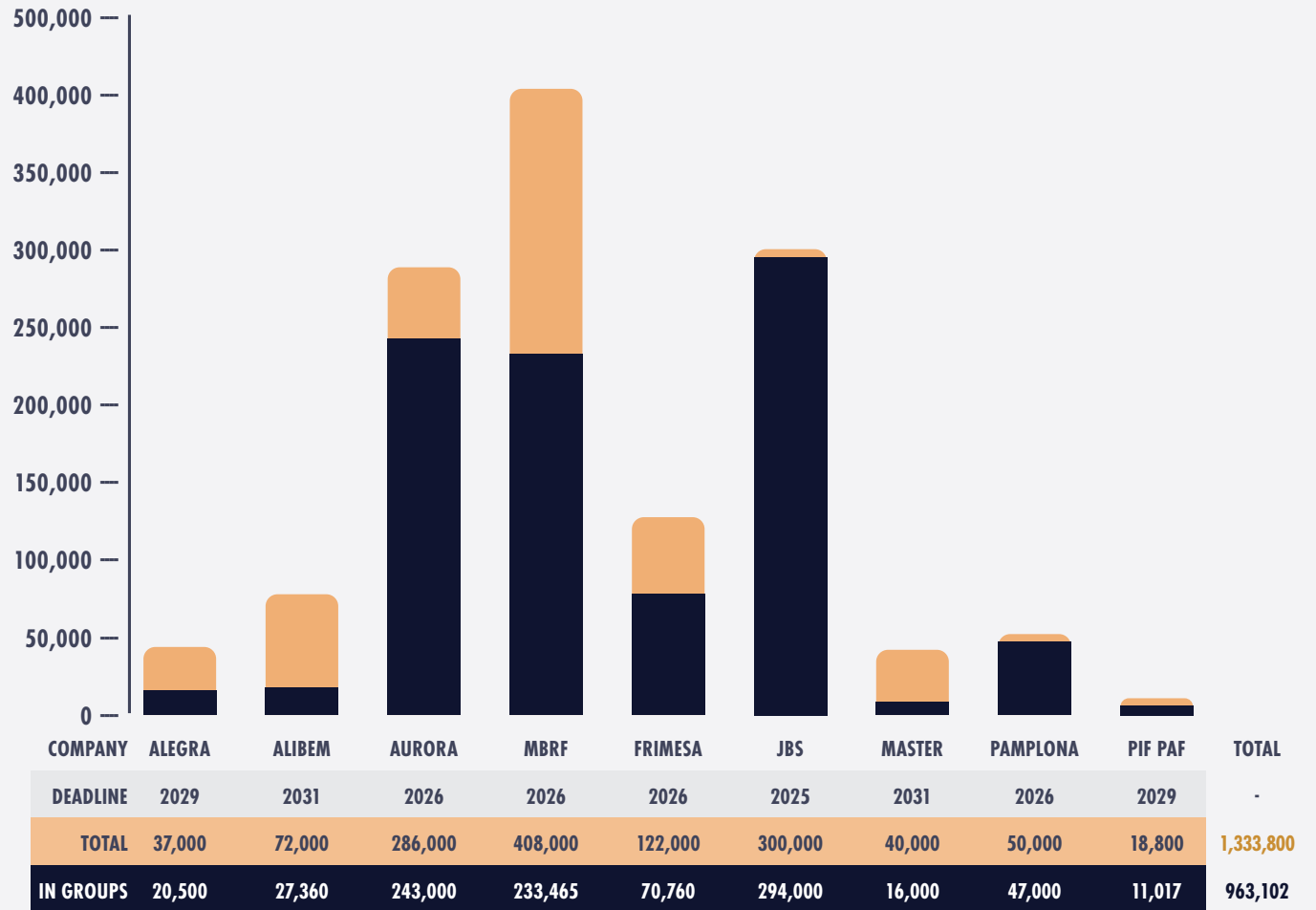

This year, the questionnaires were improved, becoming an essential tool not only for monitoring compliance with public commitments to eliminate gestation crates, but also for giving visibility to the adoption of best practices within the Brazilian pork industry.

Overall, out of a total of 1,333,800 sows, approximately 963,102 are already housed in group housing systems, indicating significant progress in the sector, although with marked differences among companies.

BROILER CHICKENS

CONTEXT

2025 was a challenging year for Brazilian poultry farming, marked by the first recorded case of avian influenza in a commercial farm, which led to the suspension of exports to important markets and highlighted the sector's sanitary vulnerability. The crisis reinforced the relationship between intensive production systems and increased sanitary risks, bringing animal welfare to the center of the debate as a strategic factor for biosecurity and the prevention of health crises.

In this context, **Alianima consolidated itself as a qualified technical voice in both the media and public debate**, contributing to highlighting the connection between production practices, animal welfare, and sanitary emergencies.

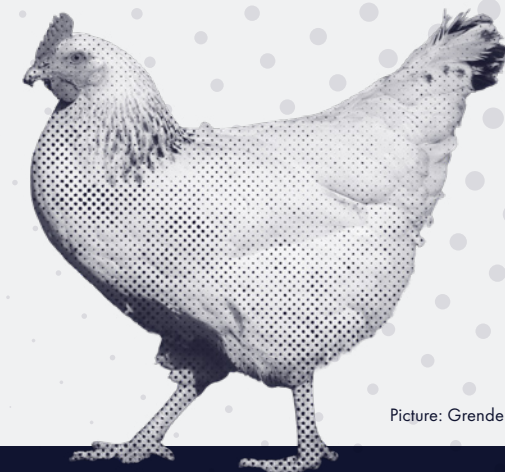

AQUATIC ANIMALS

CONTEXT

The aquaculture production chain is expanding in Brazil, but it still presents significant gaps in the welfare of aquatic animals, especially in the context of increasingly informed and demanding consumers regarding the origin of food products.

The sector still lacks specific animal welfare regulations and widely adopted standards, while the topic remains emerging in public and corporate debates, including the still limited discussion on the sentience of crustaceans.

In this context, pressure is growing for more responsible practices, particularly in handling and slaughter. Species such as tilapia and salmon highlight the main challenges and opportunities for advancing the animal welfare agenda.

STRATEGIC ADVOCACY

CONTEXT

In 2025, Alianima expanded and consolidated its work in public policies, strengthening its position as a technical and strategic actor in the animal welfare agenda in Brazil. We combined knowledge production, institutional engagement, private sector involvement, and coalition building to improve the quality of public debate and influence decision-making processes, with the aim of fostering improvements in the lives of animals used in animal agriculture.

PROGRESS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Throughout the year, Alianima's work contributed to concrete advances in the legislative agenda and public debate:

- Launch of the **1st edition of the Animal Legislative Agenda 2025**, with 12 priority proposals and 1 bill converted into law (ban on animal testing for cosmetics)
- Filing of Bill **PL 3729/2025** on egg labeling, following Alianima's advocacy efforts
- Inclusion of a priority proposal (**PL 90/2020** - force feeding) in the agenda of the Ministry of the Environment
- Partial incorporation of Alianima's proposal on "Incentives for organic production, free from pesticides and the use of antibiotics or hormones" into the **Participatory Climate Plan**, a federal government initiative
- Progress on Bill **PL 2881/2024** (animal welfare in SUASA), including approval in committee and reference to Alianima
- Advocacy efforts in strategic bills related to labeling, antibiotics use, sustainable fisheries, and animal welfare

In addition to its legislative work, the organization provided technical input to relevant public consultations, including:

- Brazilian Sustainable Taxonomy (Ministry of Finance)
- MAPA regulations on animal inspection and transport
- National One Health Action Plan
- ABNT standard for free-range eggs

Alianima also worked in coordination with other organizations, signing and supporting initiatives such as the **Declaration on Food Systems for COP-30**, the letter against **Ordinance No. 125/2024** (use of animals in sports), the letter on **live cattle exports to ALEP**, the manifesto "**Stop the Plastic Tsunami**," the manifesto "**Enough Greenwashing**," the manifesto "**Wildlife Calls for Passage**," and amendments to Provisional Measure No. 1308/2025 on environmental licensing.

RELATIONS WITH THE EXECUTIVE BRANCH

Alianima deepened its engagement with the Executive Branch, focusing on technical advocacy and contributions to public policies and secondary legislation.

- Technical seminar held with MAPA entitled “**Good Practices for Animal Health and Welfare as a Strategy for Innovation, Efficiency, and Economic Value**”, bringing together heads of the Rural Development Divisions of the Federal Agricultural Superintendencies (SFA), with participation of more than 150 public servants from across the country



- **Ongoing participation in Subgroup 5 of the One Health Committee (Ministry of Health)**

- Contributions to the National Action Plan, with direct reference to Alianima in the guideline focused on **developing coordination initiatives and activities aimed at mobilizing political engagement and resources to support the control of Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR)**

- Participation in the governance process of the program

- Elected as second alternate among 41 qualified organizations

- **Advocacy with IBGE** for the inclusion of data on production systems in the Poultry Egg Production Survey (POG)

- Engagement in the context of the **avian influenza crisis**

- Request submitted to MAPA for information on depopulation methods used

RELATIONS WITH THE LEGISLATIVE BRANCH

Legislative engagement was marked by political coordination, proposal of initiatives, and the strengthening of institutional spaces to advance the animal agenda.

ANIMAL LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

- Coordination of the 1st edition of the Animal Legislative Agenda 2025, in partnership with World Animal Protection and the Animal Rights Subgroup of the RAC, bringing together civil society organizations and outlining 12 priority bills for the animal cause in 2025. Key figures from the initiative include:

- Support from **11 animal advocacy organizations**
- Institutional support from the **Environmental Parliamentary Front**, which brings together 173 federal deputies and 14 senators, through its Animal Working Group (GT Animal), and from the Parliamentary Front for Animal Protection, with 206 signatory federal deputies
- **80 in-person participants and 900 views** on the **TV Câmara** broadcast
- **Of the 12 prioritized proposals, 9 advanced in the National Congress and 1 was enacted into law:** the ban on animal testing for cosmetics



The supporting organizations of the Animal Legislative Agenda were Animal Equality Brasil, Instituto Ampara Animal, Sinergia Animal, Fórum Nacional de Proteção e Defesa Animal, Humane World for Animals Brasil, The Donkey Sanctuary, Sea Shepherd Brasil, Freeland Brasil, and the Federação Brasileira da Causa Animal (FEBRACA).

HUMANE WASHING IN THE NATIONAL CONGRESS

We proposed and helped coordinate the **public hearing** on “Humane washing and sustainability and animal welfare commitments,” held by the Consumer Protection Commission (CDC) and the Participatory Legislation Commission (CLP) of the Chamber of Deputies, during the Sustainable Parliamentary Week in August 2025. The initiative was supported by Deputies Marcelo Queiroz (PSDB/RJ), Ossesio Silva (Republicanos/PE), and Nilto Tatto (PT/SP), and brought together representatives from the Ministry of Agriculture and Livestock.

- Direct involvement by Alianima in the legislative formulation of Bill PL 3729/2025 on egg labeling, presented during the hearing
- 25 participants in the hearing, with 406 views on the [official broadcast](#).



LAUNCH OF THE ANIMAL WORKING GROUP (GT ANIMAL) OF THE ENVIRONMENTAL PARLIAMENTARY FRONT

- Coordinated by Congressman Delegado Matheus Laiola (UNIÃO/PR). The Working Group brings together 17 animal protection civil society organizations with the aim of strengthening legislative advocacy and political coordination within the National Congress.
- Alianima played an active role in organizing and articulating the event with parliamentarians, in addition to contributing with a presentation about the importance of cross-sector dialogue for advancing the animal rights agenda.

INTERNATIONAL ANIMAL DAY

Within the scope of the Animal Working Group (GT Animal) and the Animal Rights Subgroup of the RAC, Alianima co-organized an institutional breakfast with partner organizations, with a special highlight on World Animal Protection Brazil. The event brought together more than 60 participants, including 5 members of Congress, as well as advisors, government representatives, and civil society actors.

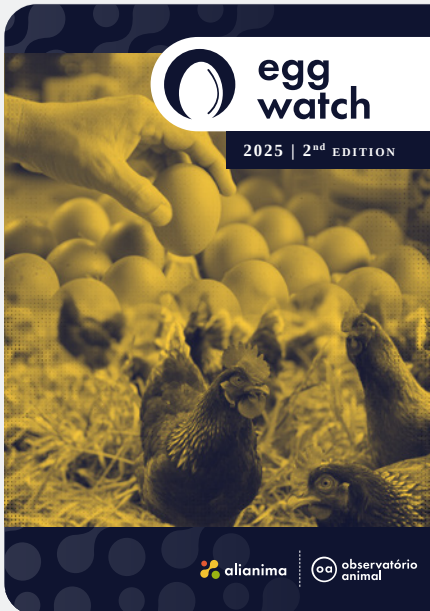

Shrimps and other crustaceans are invertebrate animals widely used in various activities including commercial fishing, aquaculture, and scientific research. Approximately 440 billion shrimps are farmed annually worldwide, representing more than five times the total production of all terrestrial animals combined. Furthermore, considering wild capture fisheries, it is estimated that between 7.6 and 76 billion shrimps in general are slaughtered each year. However, shrimps often do not receive the same moral consideration as vertebrate animals regarding their capacity to feel pain and experience suffering.

Sentience refers to the capacity to subjectively experience basic emotions such as pain, fear, and discomfort, as well as to perceive and distinguish internal states as positive or negative. In other words, it is the ability to feel, understand, or process something through one's own senses. This concept is crucial to animal welfare science because it implies that sentient beings can experience suffering, justifying the need for their protection and proper care. Sentience is not limited to vertebrates; it also applies to many invertebrates, including crustaceans like shrimps.

There is a significant gap between public perception of shrimp sentience and scientific evidence. Besides being phylogenetically distant from humans compared to other mammals, these animals neither produce vocalizations nor display facial expressions—traits that strongly influence human empathy. Nevertheless, despite remaining scientific gaps, neuroanatomical, pharmacological, and behavioral evidence consistently supports their capacity to respond to pain.

Crustaceans possess a nervous system capable of detecting and responding to potentially harmful stimuli, such as excessive heat or electric shocks. They show behavioral, anatomical, and physiological indicators of a sophisticated pain system. Evidence consistent with the presence of nociceptors^{1,2,3} and complex behavioral responses to noxious stimuli—such as self-grooming or rubbing the affected area—are examples of this.^{4,5} Besides shrimp, other crustaceans have exhibited similar behaviors and responses to painful stimuli.^{6,7}

In other experiments, it has been demonstrated that altered complex behaviors in response to painful stimuli can be reduced when animals are anesthetized.^{8,9} Multiple studies report other behavioral and physiological changes in some crustaceans, including long-term effects when exposed to harmful and painful stimuli, such as stress, avoidance learning, or the shedding of a severely affected limb (autotomy).^{10,11}

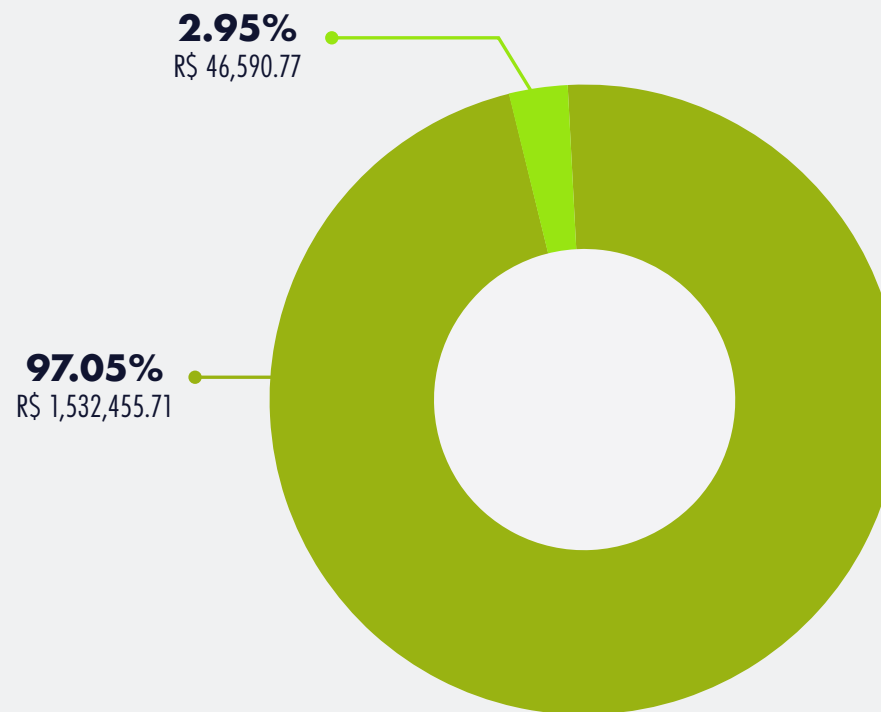
Science also provides evidence that these animals display complex cognitive abilities involving object and color discrimination, sound production and perception, individual recognition, complex learning, memory, spatial perception, decision-making behavior, parental care, and even possible distinct personalities.^{12,13} Additionally, from an evolutionary perspective, the capacity to feel and respond to harmful stimuli enhances

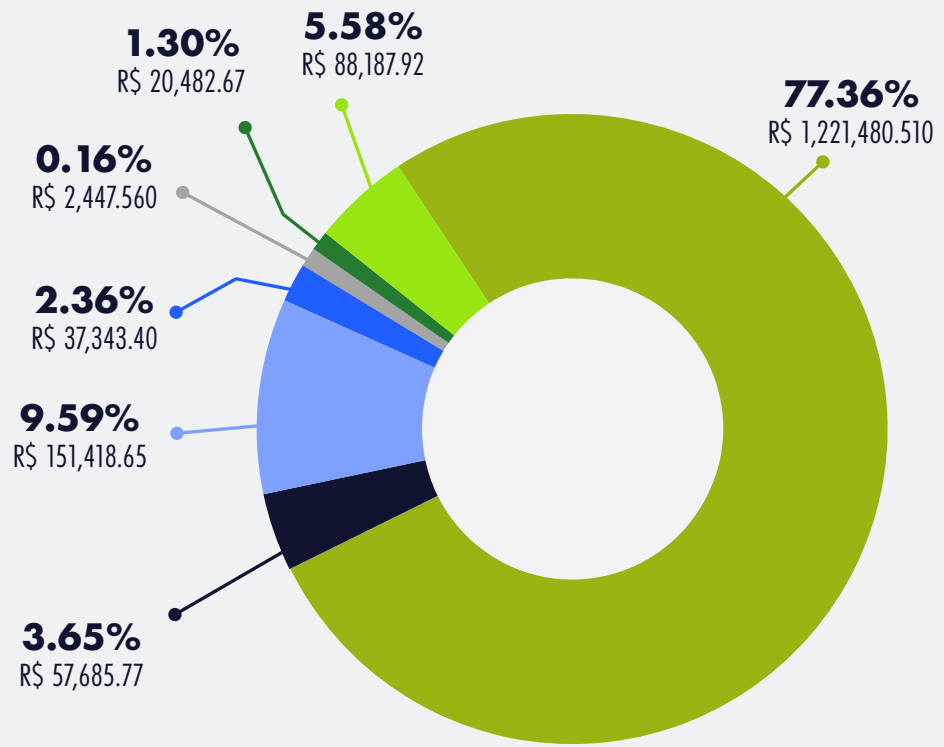
